

Ace your True or False Questions!

- Approach each statement like it were true. If even one part is false, then the statement is false.
- Pay attention to qualifiers like seldom, sometimes, always, rarely, etc. Stricter qualifiers like "always" or "never" often reflect a false statement.
- Do not let negatives like "not, no, cannot" boggle you down. Read the statement without the negative, if it is true, then the correct answer is false. Watch for double negatives.

Example: it is unlikely that Team X will not win the Championship this year. Same as: it is likely that Team X will win the championship this year.

- Break long statements into smaller chunks to read them separately and together. Longer true/false statements with reasoning words (because, since, etc.) tend to be false.
- If you are not marked down for a wrong answer, take an educated guess if you are clueless.
- Budget your time. Do the easy ones first and then come to the trickier ones.
